

GUIDELINES FOR CONTROVERSIAL SUBJECT MATTER

- 1. Manuscripts cannot have derogatory, subjective, or inflammatory comments or unprofessional language.
- Manuscript may be on controversial subjects as long as it is research- and facts-based and has supporting peer-reviewed references. Work should not be adversative or derogatory. Opposite point of view should be acknowledged and discussed respectfully and countered with facts and not opinions.
- 3. Claims must be supported by peer-reviewed references [including references not by the author(s)] and not simply opinion pieces, white papers, website copy, or unsubstantiated work. References must be recent and not outdated.
- 4. Quantitative data/information or peer-reviewed research must be provided to support views.
- 5. Claims cannot be subjective and/or personal in nature. Emotional comments should be avoided.
- 6. Content should not read as promotional or commercial material.
- 7. Personal or other attacks and inappropriate or derogatory language are not permitted. Evidence must be presented for claims.
- 8. Specificity of claims must be supported by data and peer-reviewed references.
- 9. Avoid speculation.
